

BY THE DECADE

Program, event, and field trip attendance varies from year to year depending upon a variety of factors, including the economy and what is offered to the community.

The pandemic greatly impacted the Elkhart County Park offerings and audience compared to the past decade. That did not stop staff from continuing to educate the public in a variety of ways using technology and the great outdoors.

BRANCHING OUT

We reached our audience in different ways in 2020.

When indoor facilities such as theaters, gyms, and other forms of recreation were limited, parks became one of the safer places to visit. Operation staff pivoted to accommodate an increased general attendance of approximately 20-30% in all Elkhart County Parks. Some weekdays in the spring were as busy as a weekend in the summer.

Program and field trip attendance, on the other hand, had dramatic decreases throughout the County Parks and at the Elkhart County Historical Museum, Later in the season, limited outdoor programs were offered to ensure we were social distancing and keeping our community safe.

To continue our commitment to educating the community about historical and natural resources, interpretive staff excelled in learning new skills. With the use of technology we produced educational videos, utilized social media, and live virtual classroom visits to enable our mission to continue.

2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Boot Lake Nature Preserve won a Great Lakes Park Training Institute Award

The preserve has undergone a major transformation. Restroom, new kiosks, accessible trail, and new wetland overlook provide amenities deserving of this recognition.

Wood restoration was completed by a local company and windmill painted by staff to replicate original colors used by Perkins.

MORE ACCOMPLISHMENTS



The world changed with the snap of finger in 2020. Staff went from planning projects and programs to closing down restrooms, towers, museum, gatehouse, playgrounds, water fountains and services within the park department to help protect our community. This created one of the largest challenges of our industry ever, yet we still accomplished great things!



Parks and People

- The Elkhart County Parks logo and mission statement were modernized
- Two benches and bike racks installed on the Pumpkinvine Nature Trail
- Bonneyville Mill staff transformed former gift shop into a test kitchen
- Invasive species removed at Ox Bow, Cobus Creek, River Preserve, & Boot Lake
- Two staff completed NAI Certified Interpretive Guide training
- Elkhart County Historical Museum hosted a national traveling Smithsonian exhibit *Crossroads: Change in Rural America* in early 2020
- New equipment replaced an outdated pickup truck, Bobcat Toolcat, tractor, two trailers, and a small van
- Bonneyville Mill flour placed 3rd in the "Cool Things Made in Elkhart County" contest
- Upgrades to security systems continued at Ox Bow and Cobus Creek County Parks
- Lending library constructed by volunteer and installed at Boot Lake Nature Preserve
- Volunteer appreciation banquet hosted in February

Partnerships

- 2020 Indiana Master Naturalist class hosted in partnership with Elkhart County Soil and Water Conservation District
- Boot Lake Nature Preserve featured in Indiana Audubon Society's new Indiana Birding Trail Guide
- Michiana Master Gardeners installed and cared for Quilt Garden entitled 'Practical Orchard' at the Elkhart County Historical Museum
- Several staff attended Champion Placemaker Workshop presented by Elkhart County Convention and Visitors Bureau
- A *Move More* campaign incorporated trail signs at Ox Bow County Park in partnership with Goshen Health
- Elkhart County Historical Museum continued to partner with The Goshen News to present "A Sense of Place" podcasts

Major Gifts and Grants

- Elkhart County Park& Recreation Board awarded a \$36,000 LARE grant to review low head dams in the River Preserve County Park
- A major unrestricted gift was received from the estate of Catherine Metzger, a former gate attendant who loved the outdoors and animals
- Park Board received a \$64,000 grant from Community Foundation of Elkhart County to replace a future wetland education boardwalk at Ox Bow County Park
